

# Kostin Shows 'Golden' Passing Arm As Loyola Gridders Rip Macdonald

Mike Kostin has long been regarded as a better-than-ordinary quarterback for Loyola College Warriors in the Ottawa-St. Lawrence Football Conference, but the rangy signal-caller can now apply for "star" status.

Kostin was magnificent Saturday as he engineered Loyola to a surprisingly easy 64-2 rout over Macdonald College Aggies at Loyola campus. Always known as an excellent ball-handler, Mike finally came into his own as a passer with a fantastic total of 19 completions in 21 attempts during the second half of Saturday's contest. He tossed five touchdown passes in the last 30 minutes.

And Kostin showed too that he can score with the best of them. The 6'1", 185-pound pivot, who alternated with Bernie Young as Loyola quarterback last season, chipped in with a pair of touchdowns against the inept Macdonald crew.

The Aggies in no way resembled the football team that buried University of Sherbrooke 36-0 last week. Macdonald seized a 2-0 lead over Loyola when Ted Horton smeared Loyola punter Larry Cullen behind the Warriors' goal-line, but this was the only time Macdonald was to hit the scoresheet.

With Kostin's pinpoint passing and Loyola's rock-ribbed

defence paving the way, there was no stopping coach Jack Kennedy's Warriors. Fullback Pete Howlett equalled Kostin's touchdown output, and six other players scored one major apiece. John Hogan, Al Grazys, Peter Shea, Peter Connolly, George Poirier and Cullen all notched six-pointers. Howlett completed the rout by booting four converts.

Connolly and Dave McIninch shone on defence with two interceptions apiece. Ross Brady

and Eddie Zegray also came up with sparkling defensive plays. Kostin was given superb protection from rugged linemen like Irv Narvey, Bill Costello, John McCallum and Jack Mathieu.

Loyola, with two wins in as many starts, are not the eastern division's only unbeaten squad. Bishop's coached by Bruce Coulter, connected for victory number three Saturday.

Bishop's blanked Ottawa St. Pat's 20-0, with fullback Mike Sommerville gaining 132 yards on the ground, more than one-third of his team's entire total of 328 yards rushing.

Sommerville scored Bishop's first touchdown on a two-yard plunge. He set up his own major with a spectacular 70-yard run. An eight-yard end run by Gordie Ewart and a two-yard off-tackle burst by Sommerville accounted for Bishop's other TD's. Sommerville's second scoring play was preceded by a 40-yard pass off the option from quarterback John Milligan to Dave Little.

Doug Calhoun kicked two converts to close out the scoring for Bishop's, who take on Loyola in a battle for first place next Saturday at Loyola. Among Bishop's defensive stars against Ottawa were Doug Staniforth, Bill Mitchell, Mike Lavery and Doug Kornack.
