

# Kostin Key Factor In Passing Attack

Mike Kostin, the talented field general of Loyola's football squads over the years has been the subject of a great many accolades and awards. Mickey, as he is called by his confreres, has been generally recognized as "head and shoulder" above any other pivot in the OIFC.

Mike started his football career in the bantam ranks of Loyola High School, where, curiously enough, he played both end and tackle. Graduating to junior high football, he played quarterback, a position he has held since then. His clever play-calling led Doug Potvin's juniors into the city finals that year.

In senior ball, he accredited himself admirably in two seasons of competition. In his first year, Kostin played a large role

for the N.D.G. Maple Leafs of the Junior O.R.F.U. It may be noted here that he played quarterback ahead of Ron Maddocks, currently the second string signal-caller of Montreal's Alouettes.

In 1961, he returned to the Varsity to help lead Marv Bergson's aggregation to the OSL finals. Last season Mike enjoyed his finest term under the col-

ors of the Maroon and White. His talented passing arm coupled with his excellent running ability directed Loyola to their first Ottawa St. Lawrence combined championship.

Now 22 years old, Mike has an opportunity to play professional football for the Edmonton Eskimos, the team which picked him in last year's college draft.
