

Cubs Show Grit Losing To Ottawa

Go Through Season Without A Win But Fight to The Last

The Ottawa was hung down on a grand big four game at Abbot Stadium Saturday afternoon for the Montreal Cubs but there was a bright note in the manner in which the young and lousy Cubs fought like champions and completely surprised the crowd. The Ottawa Rough Riders trails 30-0 at 1:30 o'clock.

To some minds that 18-0 score, though no moral victory for the Cubs depending on the improvement, was still something of a signal against. Cubs went through their schedule of six games without a win.

Rough Riders had come down here bringing about rolling of a season's money. They had to play all out to get the points they got and with a little luck next game better officiating they might have found the coast unaccountably clear still. For Cubs were short of a field goal owing to a disagreement by officials who puzzled the crowd on one play with their upper debate.

It was late in the game that Walter Morley, a field goal specialist, was sent on for the feature. Apparently he stood the cross-bar three times. Frank Bennett, directly behind the goal, flung up his hands signaling a field goal, but he was over-ruled by the other two officials, Ralph Adams and Roy Shandley. Cubs along the signal did not handle the ball correctly, who ran out to the Montreal ten yard line where it was Ottawa first down instead of three points for Montreal.

HAD SOME LUCK

Riders had a bit of luck on some of their plays, though there was no questioning their power and opportunity. An interception by Tommy Darcy in the second run was followed by a 35-yard run for a converted touchdown to give Ottawa six of their points.

Cubs gave a gritty display in many a crisis in the final quarter; for instance Ottawa had the ball ten yards out and wheeled their tanks into operation. On one play the Riders were hit a yard away from the goal-line when Cubs showed two things by Tom Wadsworth, the Ottawa punter. Montreal was given the ball and Gordon Noseworthy kicked out of danger.

There were times when Cubs had scoring chances which they blew. For instance late in the first quarter, Montreal had the ball one yard away from the goal line on third down when a snap went bad or a placement play. Buddy Elliott tried to get away a quick drop-kick when hurried by the rushing Ottawa wing line, but couldn't raise the ball. It went dribbling into the scrimmage and Apsy Tommy ran it back to the Montreal mark.

TOMMY STARTS SCORING

Tommy made a 35-yard run for Ottawa's first touchdown early in the game. Harman overruled. In the second quarter Darcy intercepted Johnny Grew's sleeper forward and raced for another converted try.

Noseworthy gave the Cubs a pair of points by half time. Early in the third Noseworthy and Rocky Rowan each looked single. Then Ottawa wanted their own big march of the day.
