## Stamps Wallop Saskatchewan 42-0 Bombers Lose 12th Straight

Calgary Stampeders displayed awesome offensive power as they scored a 42-0 runaway victory over Saskatchewan Roughriders in a Western Football Conference game before 20,000 shivering fans.

The game was seldom in doubt as Stampeders built up overwhelming quarter leads

of 13-0, 21-0 and 34-0.

Fumbles and interceptions proved costly to the Roughriders as the highly touted Saskatchewan defensive crew crumbled before the running and passing onslaught of the Stampeders. Coach Bobby Dobbs alternated quarterbacks Eagle Day and Jerry Keeling in both the short punt and T-formation.

The victory enabled Stampeders to stay just one point behind league leading British

Columbia Lions, who defeated Edmonton Eskimos 24-14 and have 21 points.

Saskatchewan, with two games left, have only a mathematical chance to tie Calgary for a second place finish. Stampeders have 20 points, Roughriders 16.

The offensive wrinkles appeared ideal for flanker Bobby Taylor, top pass catcher in the WFC last season, as he caught touchdown passes of 18, 35 and 16 yards to lead the scoring parade.

Taylor wasn't fussy about who threw passes, catching strikes

Coleman, who boosted his WFC rushing lead with bull-like running, crashed over for two touchdowns and Eagle Day got the other on a keeper play.

Placekicker Larry Robinson, the WFC's leading scorer, got the other Stampeder points on four converts and two singles.

Only the week before Calgary destroyed the shotgun formation of the Montreal Alouettes in a game in Calgary and Dobbs' move caught the Rougriders by surprise.

Two sparkling touchdowns by halfback Willie Fleming, the second on a record-tying 109-yard jaunt, provided the winning cushion as British Columbia Lions thumped Edmonton Eskimos 24-14 in a dull Western Football Conference game before about 12,000 fans.

Fleming also raced 47 yards on another run to set up Lion's opening touchdown, scored by quarterback Joe Kapp on a two-yard plunge.

In all, the speedy 183-pound import, who has had a spotty season, carried 10 times for 186 yards, 39 shy of the WFC single-game record set earlier this season by fullback Lovell Coleman of Calgary Stampeders against Hamilton Tiger-Cats.

The victory allowed Lions to maintain a one-point margin over Stampeders in the race for first place in the five-team conference. Stampeders, who have two games remaining against three for B.C., trounced Saskatchewan Roughriders 42-0 at Calgary Saturday, assuring both Lions and themselves of at least a second-place finish.

Peter Kempf converted two B.C. touchdowns and added a single on a wide 26-yard field goal attempt., Neil Beaumont kicked a 45-yard single and Eskimos conceded a safety touch to account for the remainder of the B.C. scoring.

For Eskimos, substitute quarterback Bill Redell, making his second start of the season, clicked with flanker Jim Thomas on an 88-yard scoring play.

Fullback Bill Tobin cracked over from five yards out for another touchdown and centre Bill Mitchell help Edmonton Eskimos trip Winnipeg Blue Bombers 13-1 in a dull Western Football Conference game before 14,882 fans.

Coffey, five-year veteran from West Texas State, caught six passes for 103 yards — Eskimo's entire aerial output — to set up one touchdown and score another

An earlier Edmonton defence that bulled through to nail Winnipeg backfielders for losses seven times and key Bomber penalties did the rest of the damage as Eskimos clinched fourth place with their fourth victory. Winnipeg plunged even deeper into last place with its 12th successive defeat.

Both teams are out of play-off contention.

Quarterback Bill Redell scored Eskimos' other touchdown and centre Bill Mitchell contributed a single on a wide 53-yard field goal attempt.

Halfback Bob Reed earned a conceded single on a 29-yard field goal try for Winnipeg's only point — the first of the game.

Bombers made the first threat to score, moving to the Edmonton 24-yard line early in the second quarter. But it evaporated when Eskimos defensive halfback Mike Kostin, formerly of Montreal's Loyola College, intercepted a long pass on the Edmonton five-yard line.

Moments later Bomber tackle Dave Burkholder intercepted a Redell pass on the Edmonton 53-yard line and lugged it to the 41. Reed's field goal attempt followed.

Eskimos added 103 yards rushing to Coffey's pass-yardage total for 13 first downs, three more than Bombers managed on 111 yards rushing and 37 passing.

Redell attempted 14 passes, with Coffey his intended target on all but two. Winnipeg quarterbacks Kenny Ploen and Hal Ledyard, who saw most of his action late in the game, completed four of 16 passes. Bombers intercepted two, Eskimos one.
